with the same momentum.

As I mentioned at the top, 1996 has been an excellent year for this young organization! The highlight of the year was the visit--underwritten and hosted by Musical Bridges--by **Professor Oleg**Gotlib, Head of the International Studies Faculty and Deputy Head of the Foreign Relations

Department, Chita State Technical University (CSTU) to the United States. Professor Gotlib came for the three-week visit under the auspices of Southern Connecticut State University (SCSU)

through the initiative of Musical Bridges and **Dr. Paul Best** of SCSU's Political Science Department in order to create a sister relationship between CSTU and SCSU. Professor Gotlib had the opportunity to meet several professors and administrators of the Connecticut State University system, both at SCSU and at the Central Connecticut State University campus, as well. The documents were signed, and as a result, several visits between the two institutions are planned for 1997 and a professor from CSTU will teach fall semester at SCSU.

While here, Musical Bridges arranged for Professor Gotlib to meet with American foundations and educational organizations to learn how his university

may become more independent and self-supporting.

Professor Gotlib gave public talks and interviews introducing the American public on a grassroots level to eastern Siberia and its unique situation. See page 4 for more about Professor Gotlib's visit.

In addition, Musical Bridges continues to provide educational materials to various institutions in Chita. Magazine subscriptions were renewed for the Language Faculty of Chita State Pedagogical Institute (CSPI) and expanded to include CSTU and the Pushkin Library, Chita's main public library.

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Professor Oleg Gotlib visits the United States

We are very proud to have sponsored a three-week visit this September-October to the United States by Professor Oleg Gotlib, Head of the Faculty of International Studies and Deputy Head, Office of Foreign Relations, Chita State Technical University (CSTU) in Chita, Russia to develop a sister relationship with Southern Connecticut State University (SCSU) in New Haven, Connecticut. Dr. Paul Best, Professor of Political Science, headed up SCSU's efforts. Documents were signed on October 4, 1996 with initial plans focusing on faculty exchange, program development and material assistance. Plans are being made for two trips to Chita in 1997 by Dr. Best and other SCSU representatives and for Professor Olga Fleshler to come to SCSU to teach a

Professor Gotlib met with many people at SCSU including President Adante, Academic Vice-President Pinciaro, Dean of Arts and Sciences J. Philip Smith. and the heads of several departments. He travelled to Central Connecticut State University in New Britain


to discuss cooperation with the Center for International Education, which serves the entire State University system, and was met with great enthusiasm.

In addition, Musical Bridges arranged for trips to Washington, DC, Boston and Vermont. In Washington he met with a representative of the Eurasia Foundation which funds projects directly in the former Soviet Union. In Boston he learned about the activities of, and received wonderful advice from, the Education Development Center. In Vermont he was the guest of honor at luncheons at the Geonomics Center, Middlebury College and the Department of International Studies, St. Michael's College. He presented public lectures about his city and region's situation, in Southbury, Connecticut and Montpelier, Vermont.

Despite all this work, we had a few opportunities to

show him a little of our country-peak foliage in Vermont, Yale University, the Capitol in Washington, trips to Ellis Island and the top of the World Trade Center in New York...and shopping at a huge Stop & Shop supermarket (which both awed

Professor Gotlib said he went home with more information, ideas and images than he knew quite how to assimilate! We hope that this is only the beginning of a steady stream of Chita visitors to the United States for teaching and study.

Chita State Pedagogical Institute and Chita State Technical University have both asked us for English teachers, and more opportunities will arise across the next few years. We are also working to bring students and teachers here to study. And there are always book and magazines to be sent and libraries to be filled.
