## Executive Director's Report

We are pleased to announce three exchanges in 1997:

- On June 10, 1997 **Tatiana Sukhanova**, Head of the English Department, Foreign Languages Faculty, Chita State Pedagogical Institute (CSPI), will arrive for an eight-week "ESL" (English as a Second Language) teacher's course at St. Michael's College, Colchester, Vermont. St. Michael's has graciously offered a full tuition scholarship. Musical Bridges will provide hospitality and help Tanya say "Hello!" (see cover article!) to find ways to help her institution. Expenses will be shared by Musical Bridges and CSPI. Tanya was my boss when I was teaching in Chita, and I'm thrilled to have the chance to try to reciprocate her generosity and friendship in the United States.
- In August Musical Bridges will send **Stacy Neterer** to teach English at CSPI for a year. Stacy is a May graduate of Kalamazoo College where she majored in International Studies. She spent a semester studying in St. Petersburg and has a deep interest in the current situation in Russia. Upon returning in 1999 she will begin a Master's program in International Affairs with a concentration on International Law and Organizations at George Washington University Elliott School of International Affairs.
- In September the SCSU-CSTU relationship will bear it first fruits. Professor Olga Fleshler, of Chita State Technical University will come to Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven to teach a one semester course on the history, politics and culture of Siberia.

Professor Paul Best, SCSU's coordinator of the CSTU-SCSU relationship traveled to Chita in April to meet with officials and learn more about the university in Chita. He plans to return in August with a delegation from SCSU bringing plans for cooperation based on his April findings.

Musical Bridges grant-seeking efforts continue vigorously. While we are unable to accomplish some projects according to our original timetable due to lack of funds, we are confident that the value of our work will be recognized soon by foundations.


As you can see in Oleg Gotlib's article, Chita's has serious needs for contact and cooperation with the West,

to Moscow.

The idea of my visit to the US was born in autumn 1995 during our talks with Thomas Dickinson, when he was on his third visit to Chita as a lecturer in the English Department of Chita State Pedagogical Institute and a piano teacher at Chita Musical College. By that time he already had organized Musical Bridges, Inc., and the main goal of this organization is to help cultural, educational and scientific institutions in Chita make relations with their American counterparts. It happens that Chita, maybe because of the great distances in the central part of Russia, maybe our being closed for more than 50 years, maybe because of stereotypes that our region is only interested in mining, but there is,

and has been, little real contact between Chita and the "Western" world.


"The idea is to say 'Hello' as many times as possible," said Tom on the road from New York to New Haven just after our meeting at the airport. It was true: it was nonstop "Hello" for three weeks. When we returned to New Haven just before going back to the airport for my departure, Tom said that we traveled 2000 miles, nearly the half the distance between Chita and

Moscow.

And what was the result? First and foremost, an agreement for cooperation was signed between our university and SCSU. In addition, there were four lectures about Chita and Chita Region, two articles in newspapers, one radio interview and many, many meetings and talks in Washington, DC, New Haven, New Britain and Southbury, Connecticut, Newton, Massachusetts, Middlebury and Montpelier, Vermont and New York City.

Summing up all this, I must say that it was only first step on the long and difficult road to real results, but a couple of days ago a chief of one of the mines came to me ask if it is possible to make some relation with us. And I said "Yes!" Hi, Tom! One more problem for you and Musical Bridges! Because, to say the truth, it's only Musical Bridges who pays real attention our plans and ideas about relations with US.
