UPDATE

Here is a quick update of developments at Siberian Bridges since our last newsletter. These exciting projects are a testament to the strength of our new leadership and Board who started this past spring.

- Computers For Kids—Current strongest focus is on this project. The insert with this newsletter describes it in detail. Reliable, networked and online computers are part of today's world. The at-risk children of the Petrovsk-Zabaikalskii Children's Home will have a leg up on computer skills and increased contact with the outside world when this program comes to fruition.
- Penpals—Local teacher of Russian, Oksana Cox at St Paul's Central High School is helping to find penpals for these young kids in Siberia. A friend abroad can expand the life of a child in a small remote town.



- Kids Care Pipeline sends a bi-monthly box to the Children's Home of material needed for the education and enjoyment of the kids who range in age from 5 to 17. Each box has a different theme. So far we've sent a parcel of jigsaw puzzles and another of music CDs. Next up is 2012 calendars featuring American scenery, then a box of DVDs. Contact us if you have ideas for future boxes and/or might have something on theme to include.
- Helping Hands Siberian Summer Camp—A new exciting initiative—still in the conceptual stages—to send service volunteers from America to a summer camp for the children of the Petrovsk-Zabaikalskii Children's Home. These volunteers would work on
 - English language and other educational needs, work on local service projects with the kids (environmental cleanup, painting, repairs, etc.), and take the kids on vacation–something few of them have ever had. (Most of them have never been to Lake Baikal, one of the world's, natural wonders, yet it is only a few hours away from the Home!) If you have an interest in one of the most beautiful travel experiences in the world–Siberia in summer, and in this area in particular!–while helping kids who really need it, please contact us about progress on this project!
- **Books Project** We continue to send two boxes of books a month. We have plenty of books for now, and our supply is easily replenished at the book sales of the County library system. A native of Minneapolis, Paula brings to the Board refreshing energy, extensive organizational experience and a solid commitment to connecting people from the Midwest with people of the Zabaikal region. It is no wonder, since she has been enamored of things Russian since her undergraduate days! She majored in Russian Studies at St. Catherine's, and earned a Master's Degree in Russian History with a minor in Russian Art at Georgetown University. She spent two summers on staff at the Concordia College Russian Language Village, and then studied in Russia through ACTR.

In 1991 she worked as a program officer in IREX, the largest academic exchange program between our two countries. Her experience there led to her own business arranging language, cultural studies, and research programs in Russia for universities, including the Universities of Minnesota and Arizona, and Seattle Pacific University. While in Moscow, Paula was the Director for the Fulbright Russian Program.

Paula's interest in Russian art led to being on the staff of The Museum of Russian Art here in the Twin Cities. She represents several Russian artists and serves as a consultant for several art museums in Russia. Currently she is creating a virtual museum of Russian art for the Internet, and hopes to open a small gallery in the near future.

Meet Natalya Skliarova

Director Petrovsk-Zabaikalskii Children's Home



Simply put, Natalya Skliarova is a modern saint. Tireless and energetic, this mother and grandmother is also mother/grandmother/aunt, confessor/teacher/ referee, and fierce defender for some 125 unfortunate children-children neglected by family and the system, who face daunting challenges to becoming functional members of society when they leave the Home at age 18. The Home is also a school with a dedicated staff who also know the importance of giving these children the skills they need to move on.

Natalya says to the children, "If you don't agree with something, don't complain. Offer an alternative, then act. Do something!" She leads through action. No matter what is going on--basketball, a social dance, or a project in or outside of the school--Natalya is right beside the children, involved and participating.

She extends responsibility to the students in making decisions that affect them, either as individuals, or as a group. They make choices and then learn to live with the consequences, a deliberate orientation toward responsible living at any age.

Natalya is tenacious against the myriad threats to her charges. One such threat is a government initiative to consolidate and/or eliminate facilities such as hers. She faces enormous pressure to close the school and put the children in the city's, a move devastating to these at-risk children, and would cost her teachers their jobs. Because she articulates the needs of the children so eloquently, and due to her passion and commitment, she has so far convinced the authorities not to implement this plan.

At her recent 50th Birthday celebration teachers and staff all said in unison: "Thank you, Natalya Nikolayevna, for teaching us to love children." And love them she does!

SB HISTORY NOTE: The Teacher Program

When SB sent its first English teacher in 1992, he was the first American to live in Chita since 1925 and the only native English speaker.

During its Teacher Program, 1992-2005, SB sent over 20 teachers, more than any other NGO providing teachers to Zabaikalye. They taught at the two universities (now merged) in Chita and in the Buryat towns of Dul'durga, Uzon, Alkhanai, Aginsk, Krasny Chikoy and Zutkulei, Most taught a full school year, some stayed for more (and four marriages transpired, too!).

All received a standard salary for the time (\$80-\$200/mo) and lived in standard accommod-ations, which meant for those in the towns, cabins with outhouses, wood heat and water drawn from a cistern or well.

We are so proud of our teachers!
