By the time I was introduced to "Musical Bridges" (as Siberian Bridges was known at that time) I had already been lucky to have spent a year in the US as an exchange student and was back in Chita missing the fluency of real spoken English of native speakers. I liked the opportunity to hang out with the Americans who came as teachers through Musical Bridges to our University; I was happy to have the little library building up from all the books that people in the US were donating and sending over to us – and even used some of them for my grad paper research. Thus, for some time moving forward, I hadn't seen more to Siberian Bridges than as the organization that was promoting English learning in our rather remote neck of the woods.

Only years later have I understood that there was much more to it than met the eye. It was truly cultural and social exchange beneficial to both parties – the residents of the faraway Siberian town and the US donors alike. In part, it is due to programs and organizations like Siberian Bridges our two peoples and two countries have been able to resist the hate-talk and propaganda of the political and military establishment. Personal bonds of friendship, affection and understanding will always overcome the black-and-white media stereotypes and help us relate to each other through all of our differences.

Through the efforts of Judith Eisner, the Minneapolis language club "Yiddish Vinkl" has donated a signed copy of a book humorous poetry by Yiddish scholar, Boris Sandler, to the Pushkin Library, and hopes to find Yiddish speakers in Chita as penpals. Kevin Brondum contributed this edition's lovely poetry translation. Joe Dickinson helped locate academic textbooks specially requested by the Pushkin Library. Karim Ezzat and his PC United non-profit continue to recondition used laptops for the Children's Center. Marie and Janet will carry them to Chita when they go to teach. Robin Hoffman continues to work on the new SB database she devised for us. She helped stuff envelopes for our last newsletter mailing. And she has also pioneered a wonderful way to donate to Siberian Bridges: an automatic contribution taken from her paycheck. We don't mean to embarrass her, but her creative way to contribute may inspire others!
- A correction to the print version that was just mailed: the long anticipated librarian
 exchange that was to begin with a visit to Minneapolis in August by the Director of the
 Foreign Languages Department of the Pushkin Library had to be cancelled at the last
 minute. We learned about this just after the newsletter was in the mail. The
 cancellation was due to unforeseen personal circumstances of the Director. Needless
 to say, we are very disappointed, but unbowed! We will get back to working on making
 this a reality.

CHILDREN'S CENTER REPORT

It has been anything but a quiet few months at the Children's Home (now refered to as a "Center") in Petrovsk-Zabaikalsky since our report last fall. The children are now looking to their exams before the summer break, having nearly completed their first year of attending local schools, rather than onsite at the Home as had been the norm for the Center's history. There have been adjustments, successes, and some issues, but **Natalya Nikolaevna Skliarova**, **Director**, feels that the kids have handled it well overall.

This transition also brought other challenges. Since there are now some unused classrooms, they are being adapted for other uses. One such renovation is a "relaxation room" where there is a new massage table and in fact, a new certified massage specialist on staff who works with the kids and the adults. Another addition is the purchase of a new inflatable trampoline (the kind we see at events where the kids get in and jump and bounce all over the place.) This is very popular with the kids as well. New microphones and speakers enhance the wonderful performing that is an important part of leisure time at the Center, its high quality sending it often to regional and even International competitions. Recently a group from the Center competed in Ulan Ude in just such an international competition, and **Zoya Chizhkova** was one of the winners. On the sports side, their soccer teams recently made the trek to Chita for regional competition, which they won.

We mention all of this because Siberian Bridges, thanks to your generosity, has been able to play a supporting role in all of the above. Our financial support has helped make these changes a little easier. In addition, some of those funds have been used for a program, devised by the Director, staff and children, of nominal monetary awards for deserving students. Natalya Nikolayevna assured us in a note accompanying the detailed accounting of the use of our funds, that these awards provide motivation, and the recipients consider it an honor to be recognized. This spring the awards were expanded beyond just good grades to recognize good

hygiene and contributions to the community. The best part is that the children themselves chose the award winners through their student government, *Raduga* (Rainbow).

A new initiative is "Suitcases". The Center is preparing boxes for graduating students with daily sundries, bedding, winter clothing, shoes, etc.--basics they'll need as they set out on their own. This may prove to be another area where SB can help.

Thank you for your financial and moral support for this place and these children, bolstering the work that Natalya Nikolaevna and her staff so tirelessly perform.

And speaking of graduates, **Alexey Kopitov**, class of 2015 and former President of the Center's student government, Raduga, moved to Chita for college expecting to live in his deceased mother's apartment--only to find a squatter had taken it over! A long court case restored the apartment to Alexey, but the squatter spitefully removed faucets and other fixtures, and made a mess that Alexey has been repairing. There has been an outpouring of help for him to defray these costs. Despite this tough start, he is doing well in his studies and adjusting well to life on his own.

July/August 2017, ~13 days

- ➤ Preliminary cost estimate is \$800 for the Zabaikalyan portion only. Does not include roundtrip flights US-Moscow and Moscow-Chita (roughly \$1700-\$2500 total). *The economical way to get a taste!*
- ➤ Minimum 4, maximum 8 tourists.
- ➤ Agent: Svetlana Lazerevskaya, Director, Ivano-Arakhlei Regional Park with extensive experience leading wilderness trips in the region, and international orienteering champion.
- ➤ The trip will include 4 days exploring the Ivano-Arakhlei Regional Park near Chita, 4 days flat-water rafting down the Ingoda River and 4 days of cultural tourism in the capital city Chita (on arrival and before departure from the region). The nature part will be in tents and a cabin, with meals prepared over campfires; in Chita it'll be hotels, restaurants, museums, etc.
